Digital Preservation Workshops in Public Libraries

## How are our patrons currently backing up their media?

- Accidentally, e.g. through email communication
- On proprietary systems and formats
- Or not at all.

## What are we currently doing to help?

The short answer is not much.

Digital Preservation Week is one seven-day stretch in the spring when some libraries pay attention to preservation education.

### We need to do better. And we can.

My proposal is a consistent, tiered system of workshops that bring up the problem and solve it in one day.

### Introductory Workshop

- Teaches every student the general ideas and language of digital preservation.
- Then students break into groups organized by the type of medium they want to preserve.
- Consultations on larger products, sales of common supplies on site.

### **Advanced Workshop**

- More advanced or specific techniques taught.
- More hands-on work for the students.
- Less instruction necessary.
- Once certified, can pay for access to tools a la carte and connect more directly with instructors.

#### What tools would be needed?

I propose a collaboration between public libraries and their local network of non-profit preservation organizations.

Use of their machines in exchange for advertising, possible use of library space for events in the future.

#### What exactly are the benefits?

- For patrons...
  - New reason to visit the library
  - Preparations for our increasingly digital future
- For cultural heritage organizations...
  - Exposure to new audiences
  - Cultivate networking with other orgs
